My deepest apologies for the lateness of this reply. We have been swamped!

This is not a Civil War landmine. They only experimented with IED's in the Peninsular Campaign (1862) and quickly discarded the concept - inhumane.

It is either of two things; a mortar round (which were very large and hand handles on them and often triggers such as wooden spikes), or is a sea mine which were much more developed than landmines. In coastal areas, the Confederates especially rigged up things like this and pushed them next to Federal boats, or strung them along waterways to impede access.
